Benefice of Buckrose Carrs

Welcome to All Saints. This guide of our Church is based on the excellent audio guide produced by our local primary school which is also available to use should you prefer. Pause a moment to admire the lightness and beauty of this 13th Century church, the first recorded rector being William de Wyrkestall in 1294. Today however only the chancel remains of that church, the rest was rebuilt in 1859 followed by further restoration work in 1886. If the sun is shinning you

will really appreciate the stained glass windows which are a feature in this church. Now turn left and you will see the (1) FONT with its elaborately wrought ironed top and engraved shield carved in the base in memory of Clumbert Henry Dowling. Continue along the north aisle and admire the





work in the (2) **TAPESTRY** which was made in 1975 to cover the book produced by the WI to link the two communities East and West Heslerton together. It shows both churches and the farming connections in this part of Yorkshire. A

addition to the church is the (3) MILLENNIUM BANNER which was made by pupils of our local Primary School to commemorate the millennium. Some pictures illustrate religious scenes whilst



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Continue walking along the north aisle to the (4) STAINED GLASS **WINDOW** depicting St George and St Eustace. This window is dedicated to Eustace Henry Dawnay who died in

1928. The next wall hanging ,which also reminds us of a stained glass window, was worked in 2003 by Nora Harrison.

Continue to the Vestry, as you turn right on your left is the beautifully carved (5) HYMN BOARD, the brass plague shows that it was donated by the widow of Flt Sgt George Alan Park RAF who died in France in 1918. Now continue past the pulpit and lectern and turn left into the (6) <u>CHANCEL</u>. This part of the

church dates from the C13th and is large in comparison to the nave. Between the altar rail and altar there are engraved slabs marking the graves of members of the Barnard family



with the oldest readable date being 1685. To your left is a canopied (7) EASTER SEPULCHRE, carved with the figures of the Blessed Virgin and Child, a symbol of the tomb from which Christ rose. The Host and altar crucifix are placed here from Good Friday to Easter Sunday. The chairs standing either side of the altar,

together with an altar cloth and pulpit hanging were donated in 1887 by Louisa McKellar. The (8) <u>ALTAR</u> with its carved front also has a simple carved reredos. The stained glass window

showing the crucified Christ is dedicated to the memory of Blanche and Mary daughters of Rev Joseph Henry Hutton rector of this parish 1882-1898. The altar cross and brass vases were presented in 1888 by M Short while CF



Burrell-Short presented the candle holders. The two carved floor standing candle holders were presented by the Rev Hugh Martin Short, who was not a rector at this church. To the right of the altar there is a piscina.

Before you leave the chancel on your left is another stained glass window. This one depicts (9) Christ the light of the world standing at the door knocking and waiting for us to let him in and is based on the famous painting in 1851 by William Hunt. As you walk down the aisle pause at the first stained glass window on your left and



looking directly above the door you will appreciate the beautiful (10) LILY WINDOW. This

is in memory of Cuthbert Henry Dawnay (1891-1964), a keen plantsman who first cultivated the blue poppy in England. The window shows a variety of flowers, with the poppy at the bottom left and was made by Rosemary Rutherford. The window on your

left (11) is by

another famous glass worker Hugh Easton. He always depicted a spire somewhere in his work as his signature. This window in memory of Lady Evelyn de Vere Dawnay, Cuthbert's mother and widow of Eustace, shows an archangel on the left with Mary and a dove representing the Holy Spirit on the right. Have you found the spire? To the right of



the window is the (12) <u>RECTORS BOARD</u>. Here All Saints church traces its Rectors back over 700 years to the first recorded in 1294. You may also notice the two bell pulls for the two pre-reformation bells.

We hope you have enjoyed your little tour; take time now to pause, rest awhile in a pew, and think guietly about this lovely building and all those who've worshiped here over the years and work to keep our church open to everyone.
